

SOCIAL WORK PRACTICE IN PALLIATIVE CARE

DID YOU KNOW? Social Workers are employed in Palliative Care, which is a specialty in caring for people with life limiting illnesses.

Palliative Care social workers help individuals and families by:

- Providing specialized expert knowledge, understanding and treatment of the social, psychological, emotional, spiritual, quality of life and functional aspects of end of life care
- Supporting individuals and families through the end of life experience; from diagnosis, symptom management, through to palliation and bereavement
- Providing education and supports to individuals and families regarding advanced care planning including Advanced Health Care Directives
- Advocating for services and access to care that promotes and respects each individual's values, beliefs and rights while preserving dignity
- Collaborating with inter-disciplinary teams for whole person care
- Providing expert knowledge and consultation services to institutional, organizational and community partners regarding the specific nature of palliative care
- Developing programs for end of life based on nationally recognized best practices
- Engaging in mentorship opportunities with students and colleagues
