

SOCIAL WORK REGULATION

DID YOU KNOW? Social work is a regulated profession in Newfoundland and Labrador (NL). There are currently over 1500 registered social workers practicing in this province.

- Social work practice in Newfoundland and Labrador is governed by legislation titled *The Social Workers Act (2010)*
- To practice social work or use the title “social worker” in this province, individuals must obtain the Registered Social Worker (RSW) designation
- The Newfoundland and Labrador Association of Social Workers (NLASW) is the regulatory body for social work in NL and grants the RSW designation
- A social work degree from a university accredited by the Canadian Association for Social Work Education (CASWE) or international equivalent is required for social work registration in NL
- Individuals with a social work degree without the RSW designation are not permitted to use the title “social worker” or engage in the practice of social work
- Social workers are employed in a diverse range of practice settings including direct practice with individuals, couples and families, community development, health promotion, policy development, administrative practice and research. - The RSW is a professional designation one holds regardless of job title
- Regulation assures the public that social workers in this province have specialized knowledge and skills and will practice ethically and competently
- The pursuit of social justice is a fundamental value of the social work profession
